Chapter Standing Rules Vote:

The Chapter voted electronically to change the standing rules. The Remembrance Committee was eliminated from the chapter rules by a unanimous vote of 15. The Corresponding Secretary will perform the duties formerly assigned to the committee.

State Standing Rules Vote:

The nineteen proposed standing rules changes outlined in the March 2020 edition of the *Hoosier Newsette* were posted on the Alpha Sigma website. Chapter members were to vote "yes" or "no" on each proposed change. Eleven members unanimously voted "yes" for all the proposed changes.

Grant-in-Aid Recipient:

The Scholarship Committee selected Anna Blocker, a senior at Culver Community High School, as the candidate to present to our chapter for approval. She was approved with a vote of 19 "yes" votes a 1 blank vote was submitted.

Gift Bag Invoice:

Sheila Akers presented an itemized invoice for \$290.10 for 30 gift bags given to new teachers in the fall of 2019. Although this expense is a budgeted item, the executive committee directed that approval for payment be put to a vote by the members. The expense was approved with 14 "yes" votes. The gift bags are the Alpha Sigma Chapter's contribution to the Support for Early Career Educators Project.

Executive Meeting

The Executive Committee held a Zoom meeting on Thursday, May 14. Attending were President Sharon Richie, Recording Secretary Jody Arndt, Corresponding Secretary Sheila Akers, Parliamentarian Sharon Henderson. Newly elected Vice President Lauren Akers and Recording Secretary Beth Cohagan were also invited to the meeting as well.

President's Report:

Sharon Richie sent copies of Form 110, the form that lists our 2020-2022 chapter officers, to state president Jo Jones, state executive secretary Carol Herzog and to Society Headquarters on April 23. She will also send a copy to Jo Ann Manes, the state's immediate past

president.

Committee Chairmen and Officer Training (CCOT), originally scheduled for June 13 & 18, has been postponed. Jo Ann Manes will be contacting officers and some of their committee chairs to announce training which is planned to be held electronically.

The DKG Society International Administrative Board has requested that the email addresses of international board members not be included in program books. These addresses can be accessed on the DKG website.

Sharon will complete the Golden Key application. The chapter was unable to send a representative to the Executive Board Meeting held in September, but may still be eligible for Honorable Mention status.

The State Convention Steering Committee meetings will be held via Zoom until further notice.

Treasurer's Report:

Kathy Ward reported that seventeen members have paid their 2020-2021 dues. She also reported that a resignation letter was received via email on May 11 from Kathy Brown.

New Business:

Alpha Sigma business meetings will be held using a video conferencing application until further notice.

Installation of the officers for the next biennium will take place on a yet-to-be determined date in June via Zoom. (June 18 was suggested after the meeting.)

The seven women nominated for membership will receive an invitation from Corresponding

Secretary Sheila Akers. Orientation will be held in late July via Zoom. The 2020-2022 Membership Committee will be in charge of making arrangements for the orientation meeting.

Sign-up for chapter committees will end on June 1. Chapter members who have failed to designate their preferences will be assigned to committees.

Sharon Richie will present Madeline Hewlett, recipient of the 2019 Grant-in-Aid, with a check for \$1,000. Madeline, a graduate of Knox Community High School, is currently attending Valparaiso University.

The Scholarship Committee's selection for the 2020 Grant-in-Aid, Anna Blocker, a senior at Culver Community High School was affirmed by electronic vote. An award certificate will be sent to her by Sheila Akers who was given permission to sign the names of the officers required on the certificate.

Sheila Akers, chairman of the Support for Early Educators Project, presented an itemized invoice for the gift bags distributed to new teachers in the fall of 2019. The cost of the gift bags is covered in the chapter budget; however, an electronic vote will affirm member approval of the \$290.10 expense. Treasurer Kathy Ward will check to see how much money has been collected for this project.

Future Meetings

What will the future hold for our chapter meetings? In the near future, meetings will be held utilizing video conferencing. Zoom has been designated for the next two meetings, but Skype and Google Meet are also possibilities.

Alpha Sigma Member Profile: Sharon Richie, a key woman educator who exemplifies "motivated to make a difference."



Sharon Richie has been a Delta Kappa Gamma member since 1995.

She has served our chapter in various capacities including president. I have known Sharon since childhood. Her sister Mary was in my class. Sharon was in my brother's class. We were in 4-H at the same time, although we didn't belong to the same club. Her uncle was married to my aunt, so although Sharon and I aren't officially related, we do share cousins in common. I remember when she came to North Judson-San Pierre High School to begin the special needs program in the high school. Her influence on that program and on the students she taught has been profound. I admire Sharon for her dedication and energy.

Sheila: To what or to whom do you attribute your drive to make a difference?

Sharon: I attribute my "make a difference" drive to my mom, Grandpa and Grandma Bau, my aunts and uncles and my Roman Catholic upbringing. Sitting in sociology class at Indiana University, I learned I was a statistic. The odds were against me of being successful. I came from a single-parent family. My dad was killed in a train car accident when I was four years old. We lived at the poverty level because my mom could only make so much money because of receiving social security. Education should not have been a priority. But I didn't realize any of this! Throughout childhood and my teen years my "Bau Family" provided support and encouragement. They were generous with their time and I felt I was a part of a "normal" family unit. I also recognized the sacrifices made for me. So, through their selfless acts and positive role models it was ingrained in me that it is better to serve than to be served.

Sheila: How has your membership in Delta Kappa Gamma influenced the direction of your activities?

Sharon: I feel being a member of DKG has made me more cognizant of being an "active" member in the organizations of which I am involved. Being president really challenged me out of my comfort zone. I made it a priority to represent our chapter at international, state, council and local meetings and I don't like to drive in heavy traffic! My biggest challenge will definitely come in 2021 being chairperson for the state convention. But who knows with Covid-19 what will the future bring?

Sheila: What are your most memorable "adventures" with Delta Kappa Gamma?
