

There's high-stakes testing, curriculum designed by noneducators, and, yes, school shootings. I urge you to find your own emotional support, from home or at school. Retirees, as well, need support. 

We Are Not from Here

We are Not from Here was discussed during our Book Club Program. Susie Matzat, Lauren Akers, and Sheila Akers led the discussion.



Three teens have no illusions about the town they've grown up in and the dangers that surround them. Even with the love of family, threats lurk around every corner. It is when those threats become all too real, the trio knows they have no choice but to run: from their country, from their families, from their beloved home.

The discussion revolved around immigrant children we often meet in our schools who are part of ESL classrooms and how their homeland situations must be desperate for them and their families to leave, often entering the United States illegally. Lauren Akers who is an ESL teacher stated that the children she works with are told by their parents never to talk about what has happened to them and how they internalize their trauma. This book helped members understand the impetus that causes people to leave their homes and how we can and

should treat them better when they come to the United States for a better life.

Susie Matzat shared the following poem that pertains to the subject of the book discussed. I found this poem on the internet. The poem appears below.

no one leaves home unless home is the mouth of a shark You only run for the border when you see the whole city running as well.

At least one joint activity for the chapters in the area is planned every year. This year, all chapters and past state presidents were invited to a brunch held at Meadow Springs in Francesville on March 11. Sharon Henderson, Donna Kida, and

Jody Arndt were in attendance along with 32 other ladies including four past state presidents. The event provided an excellent opportunity to meet and reconnect with women in education living outside our area. In addition to socializing, those in attendance enjoyed a delicious brunch prepared by the venue staff.



Following the meal, Carol Herzog, our state Executive Secretary and DKG Northeast Regional Director, shared a few words about the upcoming state convention to be held in Evansville and provided information pertaining to this summer's international conferences. In addition to her new titles, Carol remains active in her chapter, Alpha Zeta.

Kiera Crites Muller, the guest speaker, presented a slideshow about Food Finders Food Bank, Inc. located in Lafayette. Kiera and her team collaborate with other organizations to provide food for those in need and to educate, advocate, and address food insecurity in North Central Indiana.

Clarifying Grant-in-Aid Eligibility

Article VIII: Section B 2: C: iii. states (that the Chapter Scholarship Committee) shall be responsible for disseminating information about the chapter grant-in-aid and determine its recipient.

The Scholarship Committee has proposed additional wording to clarify who can apply for the grantin-aid.

Article VIII: Section 2: C: iii: a. will read: The application will be distributed to the high school counselors of the three Starke County high schools and will be available to any active member's school of employment upon request.

This amendment to our Standing Rules will require a vote at our September meeting.

2023 Grant-in-Aid Recipient

Scholarship Chairman Donna Rowe announced that the 2023 recipient of the Alpha Sigma Chapter Grantin-Aid is Elizabeth Ciapponi. Elizabeth plans to major in elementary education at Purdue University Northwest.
