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Field Trip to Starke Co. Museum



Eight Alpha Sigma members toured the Starke County Museum on July 30. Tour Coordinator Dawn Ferch gave a brief overview of student visitor activities before leading the members to the genealogy department.



Audrey Kinezian, resident genealogist, explored Kathy Ward's family tree using various research tools. Ms. Kinezian is available Saturday mornings from 10:00 a.m. until noon to help anyone requiring assistance with family genealogy.

The tour continued with information about the exhibits and many of the donors. Although several of the items are actual artifacts, some, such as the mastodon bones are fiberglass replicas.

Exhibits include arrowheads, quilts, a two-headed calf, WWI and WWII memorabilia and ordnance,

hats, toys, and the world's smallest man's clothing.

Besides giving tours, Dawn is in charge of the exhibits and museum volunteers. If you have something that you think the museum might like to have for an exhibit, bring it to the museum and it will be evaluated.

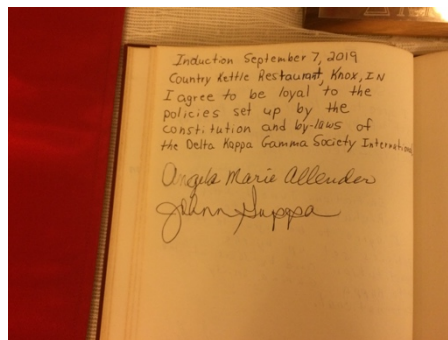

Sheila reported that thirty-six gift bags were distributed to first-year

teachers at Argos, Rochester, Oregon-Davis, Knox, Culver, North Judson-San Pierre, and St. Peter Lutheran School in North Judson.

Nila informed the members that UNICEF prefers monetary donations instead of donated items. Shipping items around the world is cost prohibitive.

International Conferences

Arts & Humanities: Sharon Richie attended the Arts & Humanities Conference in Ashville, North Carolina. Four hundred eighty members and guests from as far away as Japan and Hawaii attended. Sharon was especially impressed with the session in which members made roses from napkins, toilet paper, tomatoes, cucumbers, and other unusual items.

Leadership: Two hundred ninety-four registrants from thirty-eight state organizations, including four from Canada attended this conference in Des Moines, Iowa.

Technology: Attendees were offered more than fifty-five workshop sessions that featured instructional and entertaining technologies in Costa Mesa, California.

Professional Research & Practices: Two hundred forty participants traveled to Reykjavik, Iceland, for twenty-eight workshops, sixteen takeaways, and many keynote speakers.

Global Awareness: Sharon Henderson attended this conference and will report on her experiences at the November meeting.

Results of the Conferences Survey:

- The optimal time to attend and international event is July, August, or September.
- The preferred length of time for an international event is the same as in the past (3-4 days).
- The majority of attendees were not in favor of changing the name of the Society.
- The majority supported one vice-president instead of two.

Emergency Fund: International Conferences attendees donated \$21,341.20 to the Emergency Fund.

Alpha Sigma Member Profile: Nila Beauchamp, a key woman educator who exemplifies “motivated to make a difference.”

Nila Beauchamp has been a Delta Kappa Gamma member since 1980 and has served our chapter in many capacities. Nila retired in May of 2011 after 40 years of teaching (not in order!) grades 1-4 and G/T pullout at Liberty/North Judson-San Pierre Elementary School. I have known Nila for a long time. Our friendship dates from the late 1970s when we taught foreign languages in a G/T afterschool program. Besides being a “regular” teacher, Nila also was the G/T Coordinator for many years and

taught sessions after school. Nila was my daughter’s second-grade teacher and she had a profound influence on Lauren. I asked Nila to answer some questions for me via email to find out more about her and how she is motivated to make a difference. Here is our email interview.



Sheila: To what or to whom do you attribute your drive to make a difference?

Nila: Being invited to join Delta Kappa Gamma in 1980 was an honor. I felt appreciated because I was sponsored by my principal. I knew I was in good company when a friend and colleague was also being inducted that evening. These connections remain valued and respected. Through the years our chapter has grown with many others whom I respect professionally and personally. I have had several teachers who influenced me since kindergarten (1952-1953) through MS+. I especially give credit to Dr. Vanita Gibbs at Indiana State University. She was a professor of language arts methods; she taught us so much more about teaching children than just subjects areas.

She tactfully addressed appropriate dress when working with young children. She related a

story of making a child feel comfortable about home circumstances. She illustrated how we are always role models in all activities. I was especially warmed at a Delta Kappa Gamma Conference in Terre Haute when I sat at a table with Dr. Gibbs. She remembered me, and I felt so honored to be in the same society of which she was a member. She even remembered my name.

Sheila: How has your membership in Delta Kappa Gamma influenced the direction of your activities?
