Quoted from the *Hoosier Newsette*

"I know for quite some time membership decline has been an issue at all levels of The Society, and COVID has only magnified that. To begin the process of sustaining, and dare I say growing, our state organization I am issuing a challenge to each chapter around Indiana to have a 5% overall membership increase this next year. 5% is a very manageable number. For a chapter of 20 that would be one new member above your current membership, and a chapter of 40 would need to grow by 2 this year! We will revisit this at the end of the program year, and there will be a small recognition for all those chapters that meet the challenge, and something special for the chapter with the largest percentage of growth!"

key woman educator who
exemplifies "motivated to
make a difference."**

Ruth Schwenk has been a Delta Kappa Gamma member since 1978.

Because she taught at Oregon-Davis Schools, I would never have known her had it not been for Delta Kappa Gamma. Ruth has always impressed me with her willingness to help with projects and the presentation of her bake sale items is amazing. Ruth is quiet and self-effacing, but her volunteerism resounds in our community.



Sheila: To what or to whom do you attribute your drive to make a difference?

Ruth: I always believed that actions speak louder than words. That was modeled by my parents who lived life generously and in service to others. I watched them take a neighbor shopping or to doctor appointments, baking a cake to welcome a new neighbor, playing Easter bunny to a family with several children, sharing garden produce, or helping a neighbor harvest a crop. These are just a few of the things they did. I have tried to imitate this spirit in my life.

Sheila: How has your membership in Delta Kappa Gamma influenced the direction of your activities?

Ruth: I am not a joiner. When the invitation came to join Delta Kappa Gamma, my first reaction was to say, "No thank you." Then Mrs. Peregrine-Fosler urged me to accept. Through my membership, I've had the opportunity to meet and interact with educators I would not have had the chance to know. The programs are always varied

and interesting. Through the years, we have worked together on a variety of projects that have been beneficial to our small communities. I particularly like the gift bags for new teachers. They need encouragement and appreciation. Thank you, Mrs. Peregrine-Fosler, for the good advice.

Sheila: What are your most memorable "adventures" with Delta Kappa Gamma?

Sheila: What do you feel are your most important contributions to Delta Kappa Gamma, your community and to education?
